

HIV ADVANCED (YEAR 2) PHARMACY RESIDENCY

CRITERIA FOR SUCCESSFUL COMPLETION OF THE RESIDENCY PROGRAM

1. The resident must **complete and pass all mandatory and elective rotations**. Pass is defined as follows:
Rotations (except last HIV clinical rotation):
 - **minimum preceptor rating of three (3) for each item and minimum domain average of 3 and above** using the *Clinical Rotation Resident Assessment Form* or appropriate assessment form for non-clinical rotations.**Final HIV clinical rotation:**
 - minimum preceptor rating of three (3) for each item and minimum domain average of 4 and above for all domains using the *Clinical Rotation Resident Assessment Form***Non-clinical rotations:** resident assessed at the **designated level of performance** on each of the specific rotation assessment forms. Consideration may be given to the resident where there is insufficient exposure to one specific skill or task to adequately assess the resident in that domain.
2. The resident must pass two oral exams, one at 6 months and one at the end of the residency. Each exam will consist of two complex patient cases. The resident must achieve a minimum score of 75% per case.
3. The resident must complete a residency project approved by the Residency Advisory Committee (RAC).
 - The project must be presented orally to the RAC as well as either the pharmacy department and/or the UHN or MUHC HIV clinic at the end of the residency year.
 - The project manuscript must be submitted as an electronic copy (both Word and pdf) to the residency program coordinators and project preceptor within three months of the last residency rotation day.
 - The project manuscript must also be submitted as one electronic copy for publishing to University of Toronto TSpace under Pharmacy Residency Projects (<https://tspace.library.utoronto.ca/handle/1807/68861>) within three months of the last residency rotation day.
4. The resident must complete the following scholarly activities during the program:
 - Write one manuscript (other than research project manuscript) – e.g., case report, review article, etc. and submit to a journal for publication, **OR** submit an abstract for presentation at an HIV or pharmacy conference and prepare a poster (other than research project poster),

AND

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- Peer review of at least one manuscript submitted to a journal for publication.
5. The resident must fulfill all resident responsibilities (see document “Responsibilities of the Pharmacy Resident”). A residency certificate shall not be issued to any individual who has failed to complete all of the above.
